Smarter Strategies for Serving English Language Learners

The needs of English Language Learners (ELLs), and associated policy around serving these students, can present a challenge for authorizers and school leaders alike. What is the role of the authorizer in monitoring how ELLs are being served in their schools? How can authorizers ensure their schools are following the letter of the law in working with ELLs? Join Civil Rights Solutions in learning about new resources geared toward helping authorizers strike this balance and best serve ELLs.

Session Title: Smarter Strategies for Serving English Language Learners

The session objectives were to:

- Provide an overview of the federal legal framework applicable to enrolling and serving ELLs;
- Examine how ESSA may impact that federal legal framework;
- Discuss trends in state statutory and regulatory development specific to recruiting, retaining and educating ELLs;
- Discuss increasing scrutiny, investigation and resolution agreements from OCR; and
- Brainstorm effective outreach strategies such as the tailored use of weighted lotteries.

- 1. Authorizers have a meaningful role in overseeing the education of ELLs in charter schools through the charter application, charter contract, monitoring, evaluation and renewal; and in providing necessary guidance and information to enable schools to meet their obligations in serving ELL students.
- Authorizer oversight includes ensuring that charter schools are meeting key
 obligations to serving ELLs, particularly: a) appropriately identifying and assessing
 ELLs; b) providing an educationally sound program to serve ELLs; and c) periodically
 evaluating the effectiveness of the program in serving students' learning needs.
- 3. Authorizers are also responsible for ensuring that charter schools: a) monitor the educational progress of ELL students who opt out of the ELL program, and b) appropriately exit students from the program and monitor exited students' progress for at least 2 years post exit.
